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SJSH Wins Bid to Host Environmental Film Festival Series

St. Joseph-Scollard Hall Catholic Secondary School is one of ten schools selected out of over 50 applicants from across the province to host the *Ontario Teachers' Federation (OTF) and Planet in Focus (PIF) Environmental Film Festival Series* to take place on April 26 and 27.

"We are delighted to offer such a great event to our community," said Cheryl Wootton, SJSH teacher and film fest organizer. "We feel the selection of films and speakers is timely, suitable for all ages, and perfectly aligned with the focus of our annual showcase of SJSH arts, *Insights and Sounds*, and our second annual student Environmental Symposium later in the week."

The event is funded by the Ministry of Education to support teachers' professional learning and leadership in the area of environmental education. Planet in Focus, Canada's preeminent Environmental Film and Video organization, is working with St. Joseph-Scollard Hall to provide the latest and most topical films and videos from across Canada and around the world that explore environmental themes.

The enviro-themed week at SJSH will begin with the film festival on April 26 and 27, and will continue with *Insights & Sounds* on Thursday, April 28, and the Environmental Symposium on Friday, April 29.

Dawson Fournier loves Legit Trix. When given the opportunity at school to create any commercial using specialized audio editing software, Dawson knew he'd make one for his favourite clothing store.

"I can mix music and background sounds with my voice," the Grade 6 student from Our Lady of Fatima said. "Even when I mess up my recording, I can splice my voice and use all the best parts and delete

the parts I don't like, so it ends up sounding like a real commercial you would hear on the radio."

Dawson was part of a group of Junior Enrichment students from schools across the Nipissing-Parry Sound Catholic District School Board who participated in a week-long module entitled "Becoming a Digital Learner", facilitated by teachers Micheline Lamarche and David Bitonti.

In addition to their day spent making commercials and newscasts using Audacity audio editing software, they visited the Canadian Ecology Centre to learn about GIS mapping and digital microscopes, local radio stations to learn about news production, and Nipissing University to experiment with Mac animation technology.

Spencer Waltenbury, a Grade 4 student at St. Alexander School, said he can't wait to share his new skills with his classmates back at school.

"I love technology and I'm happy that I will get to show my class how to use Audacity," he said. "I'm going to show them how to use it step by step...I know they'll love it too."
