A gym filled with students, parents, school and board staff erupted with cheers as architect Jean Larocque unveiled the images of the future St. Luke School facility.

The virtual tour showed that not only will the new facility be built for the 21st century learner, but in line with current green initiatives as well. Some of the new facility's green features will include sun louvers, rain harvesting, and a reflective roof.

The entire school community has spent the past year prepar-

THIS SILVER IS MADE OF GOLD

Tim Silver didn't run the fastest or jump the farthest to earn his gold. Over the course of his secondary school career, the Grade 12 St. Joseph-Scollard Hall student donated over 750 hours of his time to various causes in his school and broader communities.

Tim is SJSH's latest student to earn the Gold Pin. It represents the highest level of the Duke of Edinburgh Awards, a self-development program equipping youth with life skills as they make a difference to themselves, their community, their country, and in Tim's case, other countries. He is heading to Costa Rica for ten days in July where he and 14 other SJSH students, 10 chaperones and 5 staff will begin the next phase in building a drug and alcohol rehab centre for teens and donate school supplies and toiletries to two Catholic elementary schools in Sarchi and

Grand Llano. By the end of this project, Tim will have contributed approximately 1000 hours to community service.

On June 10, SJSH Duke lead Andy Hazelwood and city councilor Chris Mayne presented Tim his Gold Pin in front of a class full of students, teachers and board administrators. "Wear that with pride," Hazelwood said to Silver. "You've earned it."

For Tim, the life lessons he gained in the Duke program are the most valuable reward.

"My experiences have changed me and I'm a better person because of it," he said. "Seeing how grateful the students in Costa Rica were (last year) to receive little erasers and calculators helped me realize how fortunate we are and that we must always try to help those who are less fortunate."
