ABORIGINAL GATHERING FORMED AT MSB

Avery Pitawanakwat (above, left), Grade 8, and his sister Lyric Pitawanakwat-Pelletier (right), Grade 5, are two of about forty students in a new Aboriginal gathering at Mother St. Bride School called *Aanjimaadidwad*, which is Ojibway for “a gathering of people”. The group, formed in September, created Aboriginal drums under the guidance of teacher Sacha Stevens and George Couchie of the OPP. They will use their new instruments during school

assemblies throughout the year. “In Aboriginal culture, the beat of a drum represents the beat of a mother’s heart”, said Lyric, who said the instruments need to be cherished by the group and the school community. “Small drums like the ones we created must be cared for by everyone around them, like a mother cares for her child.” The group meets weekly during recess to explore Aboriginal culture, traditional medicine and the arts.
